FROM ROALD AMUNDSEN LODGE 6-48 PRESIDENT STEPHEN ROSENTHAL:
My travels turn out to include a Norwegian-American story...



Pres. Steve-The approach of Halloween has had a curious effect on your President...

Late September, 2013.

First of all, let me thank all those who “covered” for me for the last two months while I was traveling. I thank, especially, Treasurer **David Bailey**, who presided over the two monthly meetings that I missed. I attended our summer BBQ dinner, but missed the Zone 1 picnic, Kretsstevne, and our youthful campers’ presentations at the September meeting. We have articles on the latter two events elsewhere in this issue of the Navigator.

My recent trip was to Montana (and Utah, Idaho and Wyoming) to attend a small Navy reunion – ship’s company officers that I served with on my first ship 50 years ago. My trip included visits to Yellowstone, the Grand Tetons, the Buffalo Bill Museum in Cody, Wyoming (world class, in my opinion), and other attractions. I do not have words to describe the beauty of that part of our still

wonderful country. All I can say is if you haven’t been there in a while, I recommend you go again.

Our reunion was at the Sacajawea Hotel in Three Forks, Montana (near Bozeman). “Three Forks” because the Madison, Jefferson and Gallatin rivers all meet at this point to form the mighty Missouri River. (The rivers were named in July 1805 by Meriwether Lewis at Three Forks. See Lewis and Clark materials on line, if you are interested. The eastern fork of the three was named for Albert Gallatin, the U.S. Treasury Secretary from 1801-14. The western fork was named for President Thomas Jefferson and the central fork for Secretary of State James Madison.)

The Sacajawea Hotel – named, obviously, for the Indian girl who helped Lewis and Clark find their way west – is a restored early 1900s hotel—one of the old railroad hotels (Milwaukee Road) owned by the local Folkvord family and managed by a young lady named **Hillary Folkvord**. The Folkvords are Norwegian-American and proud of it. Hillary’s mom is also of Norwegian descent.

The first Folkvord arrived in Montana in the 1800s, probably the late 1800s. He came with nothing. Now, the Folkvord company, **Wheat Montana Farms**, has agricultural operations that encompass 12,000 acres. The company employs more than 100 people and produces 113 products which are sold nationwide and internationally. In 1994, Wheat Montana Farms was awarded the Montana Family Business of the Year honor. In 1997, **Dean Folkvord** (Hillary’s father) was named Montana’s Small Business Person of the Year and in 1999,

Wheat Montana Farms won the Best Managed Farms Contest. Wheat Montana Farms has also made its way into the Guinness Book of World Records for cutting, milling, mixing and baking a loaf of bread in 8 minutes and 13 seconds. Their operations include a local retail bread store and other retail facilities.

In 2009 the Folkvords bought the historic, 100-year-old Sacajawea Hotel and immediately embarked on a seven-month, \$2 million renovation to both restore the hotel's historic elegance and to modernize it. The Folkvords received the **Commercial Preservation Award** from the Montana Preservation Alliance in 2011 for restoring the facility, which is now an important commercial anchor for the town of Three Forks. They were running full when we were there, with other groups, such as a wedding party, using the facility as well. But what about their Norwegian background? I think I will use Hillary's own words (slightly edited) to tell their story:

My great-grandfather came to America during the 1800s (I am not certain on the year). He was very poor and was trying to make a life for himself and his family in America so that he could send for his wife and kids. He ended up in Montana as a sheepherder. After establishing himself a little, he sent for his wife and children, but she refused to join him in America. Therefore, he started a new life. He met my great-grandmother in Fort Peck, Montana, right before WWI. They had three children, one of whom was my grandfather.

After a tough few years in Fort Peck, the family moved to a location just outside Helena where they purchased a dairy farm and some wheat land. My grandfather learned about hard work at an early age, which propelled him for his career in farming. My great-grandfather died young, and my grandfather took over the farm and expanded it to more wheat acres.

In 1978 (while my father was in college at Montana State University), he and my grandfather purchased land outside of Three Forks and moved to this new farm. They went into business together as dry land wheat farmers, carrying a huge debt from the farm land purchase. My father is a dreamer and an amazing businessman, and turned the dry land wheat farm into a hugely successful business with a mill, bakery, deli, and world-wide wheat shipping operation. Together my father and grandfather accumulated 15,000 acres of wheat land, and accomplished the so-called "American Dream."

Our Norwegian family still visits us yearly. My grandfather's brother is still alive and loves to help out during harvest on the farm. The older members of the extended family have made a commitment to make sure the younger Folkvords stay in touch. The family members in Norway who are my age have visited here, or we have gone there, yearly, and we will continue to keep good ties, as we believe it is very important...

Does this story contain a lesson?

Tell me – is there a bit of lesson in this last paragraph? We teach our young people (few in number) about Norwegian tradition, crafts, and other things, all of which are honorable. But, do we do enough to really connect them with the Norway of today? Not everyone, of course, has blood relatives they can identify and visit in Norway, but in this age of instant communication, Facebook, tweeting, etc., ought not we be trying to promote some real communication between our young people here and the young Norwegians "over there?" Wouldn't real dialog, real country-to-country visits, and the like, interest more of our youth in their heritage? I'm just asking...



For instance, letters of recommendation are often required, and busy people may not always be able to write them to comport with your scheduling needs. We recommend that anyone interested in these great opportunities go to the Sons of Norway website and start the application process now! The deadline for all the scholarships listed below is March 1st, 2014, and the programs will not accept incomplete submissions!

Astrid Cates/Myrtle Beinhauer Scholarships. These are for applicants enrolling in post-secondary training or education including trade school, vocational school or college and must be current Sons of Norway members, children or grandchildren of current Sons of Norway members.

Oslo International Summer School Scholarships. This fund offers at least one scholarship each year for a student to attend the Oslo International Summer School. Visit The University of Oslo to learn more on the program.

King Olav V Norwegian-American Scholarships. The fund welcomes applications from Americans, 18 years or older, with a plan of studies to focus on exploring his/her interest in Norwegian heritage or in modern Norway at an institution of higher learning.

Helen Tronvold Norwegian Folk High School Scholarships. Fund cross-cultural experiences for youth.

NORWAY'S GLOBAL SCHOOL FOR ITS DIASPORA

Teacher Else Mageroy has pupils spread around the globe. Her place of employment is at home in Volda in the county of Moere og Romsdal, but together with nine colleagues Mageroy teaches Norwegian children in 60 different countries.

Mageroy is a teacher with the web based Norwegian Global School which serves Norwegian children in 60 different countries. She works with nine other colleagues based in different parts of Norway." This job is incredibly exciting. I have learned a great deal about countries I hardly knew anything about," she reported to Aftenposten's reporter Arnfinn Mauren.

"The challenge with this job is to give the pupils a worthy response to their work, both positively and negatively. It is also important they are given the correct quantity of work, not too much and not too little," she adds.

Since her pupils live in various time zones, they decide when their school work is done. "We construct weekly plans and send them via the internet every Friday. Ten days later the pupils must have sent the completed work back," Mageroy explains.

The Global School teachers work in Hamar, Egersund, Dragedal, Hornindal, Skjervoy and Sorum by giving lessons to pupils living in Bangkok, Perth, Montreal; San Francisco and 50 other places around the world.

The principal, Helge Standal, says that the school has been built up gradually. During its first year of operation in 1998 the school taught 15 pupils in grades six and nine. Now it has almost 300 pupils in 60 different countries. Most of the students attend the Global School as well as national and international schools where they live.
