He is former director of the Danish government's Environmental As-

sessment Institute (EAI) in Copenhagen.

He became internationally known for his best-selling and controversial book, The Skeptical Environmentalist (2001), in which he argues that many of the costly measures and actions adopted by scientists and policy makers to meet the challenges of global warming will ultimately have minimal impact on the world's rising temperature.

The meeting is **November 13th** beginning at 7:00 pm. We will have some important end of the year business to conduct at the meeting.

2019 SON SCHOLARSHIP INFO NOW AVAILABLE ON WEBSITE

There are various 2019 Sons of Norway educational scholarships that can be applied for, **starting now.** And "now" would be a good time to start the process, as it often takes time to secure the necessary transcripts and letters of recommendation that may be required. Some of the scholarships are available to older members as well as more youthful members – check them out! About 25 scholarships are awarded each year.

King Olav V Norwegian-American Heritage Scholarship. The purpose is to fund activities in which the American and Norwegian heritages are explored, studied and shared by qualified scholarship recipients. Endowment money has been raised by selling medallions and securing gifts from Sons of Norway members. Eligibility: Any American, age 17 or older, who has demonstrated a keen and sincere interest in Norwegian heritage and/or any Norwegian, age 17 or older, who has demonstrated an interest in American heritage. Final submission by January 15th, 2019!

Oslo International School Scholarship. A scholarship to Oslo International Summer School annually for \$1,500. Final submission by January 15th, 2019!

Helen Tronvold Norwegian Folk High School Scholarship. Supports the Sons of Norway Foundation's objective of providing cross-cultural experiences for youth. If your editor were 60 years younger, he would jump on this! Final submission by January 15th, 2019! Hint: Google Norwegian Folk High Schools – some amazing opportunities!

Helen Tronvold Adult Learner Scholarship. This scholarship was established in 2017 to support the Sons of Norway Foundation's objective of providing cross-cultural experiences for adult (40 and over) insurance members. Isn't it nice to know that someone thinks that those of us over 39 can still learn something? Final submission by January 15th, 2019!

And, there are **about seven more scholarships** (some may have multiple awardees) that, in the interest of brevity, we are not going to detail here. All are described in detail on the Sons of Norway website. **If anything we have reported here is at variance with the website information, the website obviously prevails.**

Also, if you want to give your kids a language immersion experience this coming summer check out the **Concordia (College) Language Villages** (http://www.concordialanguagevillages.org/youth-languages) programs for the summer of 2019. These camps are located near Brainerd in beautiful north central Minnesota. In addition to Norwegian, they have camps for 14 other languages.





The last of an era... JOACHIM HOLMBOE RØNNEBERG (Aug 30 1919 – Oct 21, 2018)



Joachim Rønneberg's death at almost 100 years of age, the last surviving Norwegian Army officer to participate in the famous Operation Gunnerside, definitely marks the end of an era. He was a Norwegian Army officer and broadcaster, known throughout Norway, and indeed among all the allies of WWII for his resistance work during the war, and

especially for commanding Operation Gunnerside.

He was born in Alesund Møre og Romsdal. WWII broke out when Rønneberg was a young man and Norway was occupied by Nazi Germany. He joined the Norwegian Independent Company One in 1942, having escaped Norway to Scotland. He was trained in England and put in charge of Operation Gunnerside, a covert action against the Norsk Hydro heavy water production plant in Vemork in 1943. Rønneberg led the demolition team that on the evening of Feb 27th they planted and set off explosives to the Hydro plant. Rønneberg subsequently commanded other raids against the Germans. His service ended with the liberation of Norway in 1945. He was awarded Norway's highest decoration for military gallantry, the War Cross with Sword.

His exploits were immortalized in many books and the 1965 movie, The Heroes of Telemark, with Kirk Douglas and Richard Harris. (Editor's notes: This article was reprinted, with some editing, from Gulldalen Lodge's newsletter, Avis. If there is ever sufficient demand, we could arrange to show this film at a meeting. Also, it is interesting to note that the star of the movie, Kirk Douglas, was just a little older than was Rønneberg, and is still alive at the age of 101+!)

Late News (8 November 2018)... NORWEGIAN WARSHIP COLLIDES WITH TANKER

Norway as evacuated all 137 crew from one of its warships after it collided with a Maltese oil tanker in the Hjeltefjord near Bergen. Eight persons were slightly injured. The **KNM Helge Ingstad** frigate has been listing dangerously and there are fears it will sink. Damage to the tanker was moderate. Reportedly little or no oil has been spilled.
