IN MEMORIAM

FLORENCE SMITH—ANOTHER GREAT NORWEGIAN BY MARRIAGE

We lost another non-Norwegian spouse who worked very hard for the lodge when **Florence Smith** died in June after a lengthy illness. I met recently with husband Jim and daughter Kris to remember her. She and Jim (the Norwegian) quickly made themselves useful when they joined our lodge in 1976.

Florence had the ability to stay unruffled in the kitchen for lodge dinners amid strong personalities like Eleanor Malme and Irene Karlstad. Tempers could flair, and Jim remembers one hilarious "discussion" about whether or not coleslaw should include pineapple. They made meatballs all day on Fridays, and Kris remembers her mom taking a tuna fish sandwich for lunch during Lent as she was Catholic.

Later Florence and Carol Lee Solheim made the meatballs themselves in Carol Lee's kitchen. The Smith and Solheim families had many bonds, as the daughters lived together as roommates, and the parents traveled together to other Sons of Norway lodges.

For years Florence baked Norwegian cookies for lodge events, making krumkake, mormomson, almond cake, and a spritz cookie. She worked hard on the Camellia Festival, handing

out forms at a membership table. Later she baked for the Vikingfest and the Scandinavian Festival. She also served as lodge secretary, and membership secretary, keeping track of members.

I bonded with Florence when she was writing the Navigator, typing it and having it copied to a stencil. Then I would run the paper off on a mimeograph machine that had to be inked just so or it would sputter ink around the room. She calmed me down as I threatened to throw the machine in Folsom Lake.

Florence was the oldest of five kids in a military family and helped her mom a lot. She enjoyed living

in Japan where they had house help and she got to be a kid. Spending World War II in Washington, DC, was also fun, as the five kids had the run of the city despite their father being a military cop.

Jim and Florence met in the military in Pittsburg, PA, when Jim was working with Florence's mom. Mom took a liking to Jim, and introduced him to her daughter, leading to a marriage of seventy years, son Doug, daughter Kris, four grandchildren, and nine great-grandchildren.

The family crisscrossed the United States during Jim's twelve years in the Army and ten years in the Air Force. They returned to Roseville after Jim retired from active military service. Both Jim and Florence worked as civilian employees at McClellan Air Force Base until it closed.

Jim remembers Florence as very generous with both her time and money. She was active in the Auxiliary at Sutter Hospital in Roseville for twenty two years, managing the gift shop several times. She built profits from \$2,400 a month to \$5,900 a month, and this money was earmarked for specific projects at the hospital, including the neonatal ICU for premature babies.

Jim's family came from the Lofoten Islands on one side and near Lillehammer on the other side of the family, which they were able to visit after the 2000 Convention in Stavanger, Norway. They both liked to travel and were a team, in marriage and in working for the lodge.


All persons interested in attending the pizza event are urged to register for it as requested in the event flyer found on page 2. We would like to be comfortable that we have enough pizza for all.

As many of you may have seen in news accounts from Norway, a 10-year-old wooden bridge collapsed this past August 15th. The bridge was located over a river in the Gudbrandsdal Valley, not too far from Lillehammer. Two vehicles were traversing the bridge at the time, but the drivers of both were rescued.

Sadly though, two Trolls living under the bridge were crushed to death. They appeared to be a young couple. Amazingly, their baby child, or Trollette, was spared. Authorities were able to locate the deceased couple's will, etched into a wood column of the bridge, and learned that in the event of tragedy they wanted their child to be adopted by another Troll couple, especially one living under a more sturdy bridge.

UKRAINE- HOW FAR FROM NORWAY?

So how far is it from Oslo in Norway to, say, Lutes in Ukraine? 1200 miles? 3100 miles, 4300 miles? The answer, less than 1100 miles, even though the route takes one through much of Sweden, across the Baltic Sea, and then entirely through Poland. Compare this to the distance from New York City to St. Louis – 950 miles. Or from the northern California border to the southern California border



- 1040 miles. Or from Sacramento to Omaha – 1580 miles!

Western Europe is probably not as large as many of us who live in a rather geographically large country (USA), and next door to an even larger country (Canada) perceive. Of course, the Ukraine conflict is currently centered in eastern Ukraine, not the western portion close to NATO countries.

"BETRAYED," A TREACHEROUS HOLOCOUST TRAGEDY (2021)

(Original title: "Den største forbrytelsen")

Norwegian family victim of Nazis and collaborating countrymen

"Betrayed" opens with Nazi collaborator Knut Rød (Anders Danielsen Lie) tranquilly dispensing orders to his men to detain the remaining Jews left in Oslo. It's a small, quiet vision of the bureaucratic work upon which fascist genocide is built, and it casts a mournful pall over the ensuing action, which flashes back three



years to pick up with the Brauns. Theirs is a family of devout Jews save, to some extent, for Charles (Jakob Oftebro), an up-and-coming boxer who loves his clan and its traditions and yet blames his heritage for his problems. Consequently, he has no problem marrying a gentile, Ragnhild (Kristine Kujath Thorp). While such a move seems designed to rub his mother Sara (Pia Halvorsen) the wrong way, it turns out that Ragnhild is warmly welcomed into the household, which also includes Charles' father Benzel (Michalis Koutsogiannakis) and brothers Harry (Carl Martin Eggesbø) and Isak (Eilif Hartwig).
