Governor Plans Typical Norwegian Prison Paradise

SAN QUENTIN TO GET "REMODELED"

San Quentin Prison is California's oldest, having been first constructed in 1852 to house all the bad guys that the Gold Rush attracted to the state. The government made the convicts themselves build it — one of the few government projects ever that made total sense. It has been the sole state facility to hold execu-

tions, and for a while during its history, the staff got quite proficient at it and readily took to new methods as they developed – originally using the hanging technique but later embracing the use of electricity in the form of "the chair," as well as the gas chamber and finally that admirable scientific advancement, lethal injections. Some of its famous residents included Richard Ramirez, referred to as the night stalker, and Charles Manson. Although already a prison known throughout the world, it was immortalized with the release of **Johnny Cash at Folsom Prison (1968)**, recorded live in front of an audience of 2,000 inmates at the prison.

To be rebuilt following the Norwegian model...

But that brutally colorful history will soon be just that – history. California Governor Gavin Newsom has announced that the state will transform San Quentin Prison into "a center for education and training within the prison system," modelled after Norway's "rehabilitation facilities" emphasizing services and sup-

port instead of punishment and cold, dank cells suitable only for, well, maybe convicts.

Norway's criminal justice system, known internationally as the "Norwegian model" focuses of rehabilitation and the residents have private apartments, ombudsman representation, and other rights. The normal maximum sentence is 21 years – does this mean Anders Breivik, shooter of 69 members of the Workers' Youth League on the island of Utoya in 2011 will one day be walking among all the tourists in Oslo? Don't know.

Anyhow, back to San Quentin. Needless to say, an NBA-quality basketball court will be con-

structed on the grounds, and also some Wimbledon-quality tennis courts for the white collar criminal boys. Residents will be able to check out sailboats for relaxing on San Francisco Bay. It is rumored that the plan is to build 10 bungalows with adjacent cabañas on the edge of the San Quentin property overlooking San Francisco Bay for use by the better behaved residents, and perhaps several penthouses on the top of one of the buildings. One of these will be reserved for the "most notorious scoundrel currently in residence." Another feature to be added will be a helicopter pad

Lot X may get 14-story building made of wood using Norwegian techniques!

THE BUMPY HISTORY OF SACRAMENTO DOWNTOWN LOT X

Back in 2006 California's huge pension system, CALPERS, (current asset value somewhere around \$442 billion!) was trying to make money in real estate. Around that time they agreed to co-invest with a local developer to develop two of the tallest residential buildings west of the Mississippi River, right here in Sacramento. The planned site? – Lot X at the southwest corner of Capitol Mall and Third



Street, near the Tower Bridge, as shown in the picture-diagram. However, the economic downturn of 2008 killed that project and to protect at least a portion of its investment PERS had to buy out the developer for about \$71.8 million. Since the land was appraised at about \$15.8 million the fund had to write off about \$50 million. In the interim other projects have been proposed for the site, but none has come to fruition. PERS has decided to sell the parcel, which seems imminent, and they may recoup some of their investment when they do.

A Nashville developer has plans to build a 14-story mass-timber (i.e., wood!) building on the site. This is a type of construction developed in Norway and now being increasingly considered throughout the world wherever there is an ample supply of timber. (See next article.) The construction features glu-lam beams (layers of wood glued together to make a very strong beam), and the resultant project is very strong, fire resistant, and attractive — the wood can be left exposed, unlike a steel building which has to have some sort of skin material. This type of construction is a far-cry from what California has been used to for many years —wood frame and stucco buildings that cannot be taller than three stories. So, the project bears watching...

WOOD IS IN (AND ALSO UP IN THE AIR!)

For years the general opinion of American engineers and construction companies was that the maximum height of wooden structures should not exceed three stories. As can be readily seen in many communities in the southern and southwestern portions of the United States, there are thousands of three story apartment buildings built in the mid to late 20th century and constructed of "stick," or as is often said in California, "frame and stucco" construction.

In Norway and other Scandinavian countries high rise buildings are increasingly being constructed of wood products manufactured from local timber. The largest such building, Mjostarnet, was finished several years ago. It is an 18-story structure containing office floors, hotel floors and in the upper floors, apartments. The total floor area is around 122,000 square feet. The name reportedly translates as Tower of

Mjosa, as it is located in the city of Brumunddal on the northeastern shore of Lake Mjosa in Norway (Norway's largest inland lake). The building is the tallest all wood structure in the world. It has office, residential and hotel levels. The glulam beams are manufactured from local lumber, and the trees that are used must be replaced per Norwegian laws.

At first, the locals referred to the building as "the world's tallest torch," but in fact glulam beams char in a fire but are not totally consumed. An upscale sprinkler system capable of holding a greater than typical volume of water is installed to further increase the fire safety in the building. All the facilities in the tower are equipped with separate fire safety systems to control the spread of fire horizontally and vertically. The outer wall elements are designed to prevent the spread of fire via the facade.

And as our previous article indicated, such buildings are being contemplated in the USA.
