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FROM PRESIDENT TOVE-LISE:


Greetings! Writing this on my way to Norway. Hoping the

NORWEGIAN FIRM— WIND POWER PROBLEMS




"At the moment, we are crisis," said Anders **Opedal**, chief executive of Equinor, a major Norwegian energy company.

Equinor and BP are supposed to be developing three wind farms off the coast of New York to power around two million (!) homes, but they told the state that it will need to renegotiate power prices or else the projects won't



get financing. The Wall Street Journal notes that the holdup of these projects, which would generate 11.7 gigawatts of energy, or enough to power more households than exist, say, in the state of Texas, likely pushes 2030 offshore wind targets out of reach for the Biden administration and European governments.

A dam on the Glåma River, Norway's longest and most voluminous, suffered a partial hydroelectric dam failure.

A tribute to Edna by Carol Francis...

EDNA MAE JOHNSON, 63-YEAR MEMBER OF SONS OF NORWAY, PASSES AWAY

July 25, 1927 – August 4, 2023



When I joined Sons of Norway in 1980 at the lodge on Darina Avenue in North Sacramento, I immediately became friends with **Knute Johnson**, originally from Bygdøy near Oslo. He had entered the United States as an adult and retained a charming Norwegian

accent, speaking nearly the same dialect I learned as an exchange student. We always spoke Norwegian but he was quick to introduce me in English to the love of his life, his wife Edna. That he adored her was evident, that it was mutual I saw quickly in her eyes and proud smile.

They met at a USO dance at the Kansas City Army Depot where they both worked. He had an Old World charm and impeccable manners; she was very much the lady, always well dressed with nicely coffered hair and a sincerely happy countenance that reached her eyes. Knute had come to the United States at eighteen, learned English and then completed his high school diploma and college degrees. He was sixteen years her senior, recognizing a princess when he saw one despite her lack of royal birth. She in turn recognized his potential, as he was already an Army Sergeant.

Edna was the youngest of six children born to Henry and Nellie Mae Samples. They lived on a small farm near Quincy, Hickory County, Missouri, in a time and place without electricity and running water. Her older siblings and parents worked constantly on their farm which was foreclosed upon during the Great Depression and prolonged drought of the 1930s. Edna started her education in a one-room school-

When I joined Sons house near her home, walking to classes. After losof Norway in 1980 at ing the farm, her family moved a half mile to the forthe lodge on Darina mer home of her grandfather. Her mother was diag-avenue in North Sac-nosed with cancer in 1939, dying in February 1940.

Her older siblings left home by 1944, with her four older brothers joining the US Navy. Her older sister Reva moved to Kansas City to work for Pratt & Whitney Aircraft. Her father Henry wanted all their children to finish high school, and so she attended Weaubleau School in Weaubleau, Missouri. Losing her mother at age thirteen was hard enough, but she was also in a tough position being the only child left at home with her farmer father. She happily embraced her new step-mom in December 1943 when his father married a widow, Susan McLerran.

During 1944 her life changed when she left home to escape the hard farm life, joining her sister Reva in Kansas City. Here she found work at a US Army Quartermaster Depot, where her job was to receive the personal belongings of soldiers killed overseas and get these shipped to their families. On the bright side, she met Knute, and they married in Kansas City, Kansas, on March 2, 1946. They moved to Sacramento because Knute had been through there once, and liked

the then small town. The family prospered with three children, **Norma, Stanley, and Les,** and they enlarged the family home on Knight Way several times.

Once the children were a little older, they joined Sons of Norway, Roald Amundsen Lodge, where Knute enthusiastically played his accordion and helped with fish dinners. Edna took Norwegian lessons, and was active in Viking Sisters providing Norwegian home-made cookies well into her eighties. The family visited Norway many times, including seeing both families when Edna's brother was stationed in Norway with NATO.

Edna outlived many of her friends in the lodge, but remained close to **Gwen Lokke**, eleven months younger than she, celebrating their birthdays in June and July together. They had this younger friend —me— who occasionally joined them, but more often talked with them on the phone or exchanged emails and Christmas greetings with them. Writing this made me understand why she wanted to stay in the lovely home she shared with Knute, who brought so many smiles to her eyes. They are together again.

Her family is holding services on Sunday, August 27th, at 12 noon at East Lawn Cemetery, 4300 Folsom Blvd, Sacramento. Gwen Lokke is in frail health at age 95, and I will be working as a historian on the Northwest Passage with *Hurtigruten*, but we both send greetings for the celebration. Join Vesterheim's first ever beer tour. Norway has a rich home brewing culture. We will visit six microbreweries on Norway's West Coast. At each one, we will have a beer tasting and learn about their local brewing traditions and philosophy.

At Voss, we will learn about the old-world tradition of ale bowls (kjenger) from a renowned expert Sverre Strandenes. An ale bowl is more than a drinking vessel. It represents some of the best Norwegian folk art and craftsmanship, an important part of Norwegian cultural heritage used in social and ceremonial roles.

Pulpit Rock Brewing in Decorah, Iowa, and Lervig Brewing, in Stavanger, are collaborating on a beer in 2023. Pulpit Rock is named after a local geographic feature in the Decorah Driftless region. It is also named after the world-famous Pulpit Rock in Norway (*Preikestolen*). On a free day in Stavanger, we will visit Norway's Pulpit Rock! You can hike there or see it from below by ferry.

You will not want to miss this tour. Not only will you get to taste some of the best beers in Norway, but you will experience Norway's scenic beauty and learn about an important part of its history and culture.
